

Water for Wildlife Foundation

Lander, Wyoming

The Water for Wildlife Foundation (WFWF) works to preserve and protect both habitat and wildlife in areas lacking the most vital resource of all – water. Starting in 1975, water development projects were completed primarily for the benefit of Pronghorn antelope in the western United States. Over the last two decades, the program and projects completed have expanded to include

projects benefiting not only Pronghorn antelope, but all big game species, upland game birds, waterfowl, and numerous non-game species of mammals and birds. From Kansas to California, WFWF has helped provide supplemental water resources for wildlife in twelve western states to date.

Wildlife have been known to expand their ranges into previously unoccupied habitats once water has been developed. Across the West, native species and their habitats have been adversely affected by drought. Annual precipitation in some of the arid portions of the West may be less than 6". By providing permanent and reliable supplemental water sources, Water for Wildlife has improved seasonal and year-round habitats for wildlife. Pro-



vide water and wildlife will come. Types of projects include guzzlers, springs, wetlands, conversions to solar wells, etc. Each water project is uniquely designed to take maximum advantage of location, conditions, and topography.



One of the keys to success is the close cooperation with state game and fish departments, the Bureau of Land Management, other state and federal agencies, and other non-profit conservation groups to ensure the proper placement and design of projects to achieve maximum benefit. These agencies and organizations, with the help of wildlife biologists and other natural resource professionals, have assisted Water for Wildlife in the development of over 450 supplemental water sources throughout the West. Through the careful placement, management and maintenance of water developments, WFWF has helped hundreds of different wild species thrive in arid western landscapes. Bighorn sheep and the Greater Sage-grouse are two iconic western species that Water for Wildlife projects have specifically benefitted.

The Water for Wildlife Foundation is committed to playing a pivotal role in the conservation of wildlife through the development of water resources. WFWF helps bridge the gaps between agencies and other partners to implement projects. Water for Wildlife projects should have at least a 1:1 funding match. Projects are ranked, and funding is approved based on benefits to area wildlife, need for water, cost effectiveness, cost-share partners identified, and public benefit. This project funding range can and often does vary from project to project. This is not limited to, nor does it ensure previous WFWF grant funding approval amounts. The Foundation is encouraging your agency or organization to partner with us to support our efforts of making water as accessible to wildlife as possible.

- Improving wildlife vegetation around pre-existing water sources
- Water discovered by energy companies while drilling for resources

From the desk Ryan Amundson WFW Statewide Game & Fish Habitat Biologist



Past Shooters,

Summer 2016 was a busy one for me as I traveled throughout the state coordinating with Wyoming Game and Fish Department (WGFD) personnel and our many conservation partners. I spent many days completing habitat assessments for mule deer in southeast Wyoming, looking at summer, transition, and winter ranges on foot and horseback. Several Water For Wildlife sponsored water development projects were initiated or completed in Wyoming, including Elk Mountain Guzzlers (WY / SD border), Mormon Handcart Ranch well and tank, Seminoe Mountain Guzzler, and Ruby Knolls well, solar pump, and tank. All of these projects will provide immediate benefit to wildlife including pronghorn, bighorn sheep, sage grouse, and mule deer. Water For Wildlife continues to play an integral role in project administration and providing seed money to get these projects completed!

Unfortunately, I missed the One Shot Hunt and associated meetings and tours this year. I trust that everyone had a great time again. Fortunately, the reason I missed the events was due to the fact that the hunting gods were kind enough to provide the Amundson family with some once-in-a-lifetime licenses for 2016. My 19 year old daughter, Sierra, drew a Snowy Range / Wyoming moose license, with drawing odds of 1 / 650. We scouted every weekend in August, and hunted 16 days in

September. Sierra harvested a 161" B&C record book bull with her bow, her first archery kill. I called the rutting bull into a distance of 20 yards, and Sierra made a great shot. We enjoyed the father/daughter time together and both made many sacrifices to get it done. It was time in the woods that won't soon be forgotten. I made my annual trek to the Wind River Mountains above Pinedale in early October to hunt elk in the Jim Bridger Wilderness. Again, hunting gods were smiling down on me, and I harvested a beautiful 6x6 bull and my hunting partner also killed his first moose. The Wind Rivers are a spectacular mountain range and my breath is taken away every time I ride my horse in there.

In mid-October I traveled to the Missouri Breaks of north central Montana to hunt bighorn sheep in Area 680. One of the most coveted and hard to draw big game tags in North America, with draw odds exceeding 1 / 4,000. I hunted 16 consecutive days, accompanied by friends and family, passing up many great rams, looking for the "one". I harvested a beautiful 7 year old ram that green scores 190", with 16" bases and 41 3/8" horn length. The ram will easily make the all time B&C

record books after the 60 day drying period. I have dedicated much of my time personally and professionally, to benefit bighorn sheep, so this meant a lot to me. The Missouri Breaks is a rugged landscape and is some of the most incredible bighorn sheep habitat found in the Lower 48. Like many other places in the West, water appears to be a limiting factor in portions of the Breaks. I have made contact with Montana Fish, Wildlife, and Parks personnel to discuss how Water For Wildlife might partner with their agency in the future.

So now after a long and successful hunting season, it's back to work. I am working with your Executive Director, Erica Flom, reaching out to state wildlife agencies and conservation organizations in the western U.S., developing partnerships and identifying opportunities for water development projects that will positively impact wildlife in each state west of the Mississippi River. The Water For Wildlife Foundation has also changed the deadline for project application submission. Instead of reviewing applications twice annually (June and September), the board and I will only review applications once a year. Applications will be due January 31, with review and notice of funding approval by mid to late March. This new application deadline is more in line with the other conservation organizations and wildlife agency project funding application deadlines. We feel that we will be better able to fund "the best of the best" applications by reviewing and allocating once per year as well. The WFWF staff and myself will still provide project updates and notice of project funding decisions at the Foo Foo Rah and One Shot events annually, as well as in the Gazette.

I continue to be excited about the momentum the Water For Wildlife Foundation is gaining. We are making connections with individuals, agencies, and organizations that can lead to long term and mutually beneficial partnerships. As always, I am energized by the passion and enthusiasm that members of this organization show towards wildlife conservation. We are making positive things happen on the landscape for wildlife. That is exciting and something we can all be very proud of.

From the desk of Paul Fonatine Hunt Club President




Season greetings,
