

Hello Past Shooters and Friends,

Hard to believe we are already into summer and September is just around the corner. The Foo Foo Rah was great and we had a good dialog on our Foundation's initiatives and fund raising. Thanks for the great discussion and good ideas going forward.

We had a great year for water projects due to a great year in donations. We were able to commit to 14 projects and 2 repair efforts – a great year. Thanks again to Ryan Amundsen, Wyoming Game and Fish Biologist, for his great work in researching the 17 submissions and developing our recommended approval list. Also a well done to our 'Office' folks for their support. The new project approval process, where we review and approve projects in late March, worked well and allowed us to issue approval grants in April so grant recipients could begin work in early summer.

Another key initiative we have underway is the expansion of our Museum which will allow us to expand and reorganize our display space, enhancing our ability to 'tell our story' about our heritage and the conservation impact we have to wildlife habitat through our water projects. The Museum committee and the Board have some initial designs reflecting these proposed changes which will be on display in the Museum during our September meetings. Having a facility that helps us educate and communicate our message is a great asset.

As we approach the September event I would like to challenge us all to contribute to our fund raising initiatives. Our Water Project program's continued growth, our Museum expansion project and our Educational mission (Interns and Scholarships), all rely on a steady stream of donations. As a group, we can be proud of our achievements, but I believe we can do more – we are only limited by the funds we have available to allocate to these programs. Thanks for all you do to make the WFWF auctions a great success – do not forget to send in your auction items to the 'Front Office' this summer.

From our 2017 Water for Wildlife Interns



Hello everyone,

I am very grateful for this opportunity to work as an intern with both Water for Wildlife and Wyoming Game & Fish to learn more about managing water resources for wildlife. I am currently wrapping up my Master's Degree in Rangeland Ecology & Watershed Management from the University of Wyoming. My research examines the effects of long-term wetland persistence in the northern Great Plains on bird diversity and vegetation productivity. This internship is a great fit for me to bring my passion for wetlands and water resources to Water for Wildlife and to learn more about on-the-ground construction and management of water resources to benefit wildlife.

At Water for Wildlife, I have been working with Jacob to coordinate over 50 participants who will help install four wildlife guzzlers in July on the Ferris Mountains to benefit bighorn sheep. One of my projects this summer is to capture the installation of guzzlers in the Ferris Mountains on video and create a short video for WFW about this project – stay tuned. Throughout the summer, I will continue to update records of WFW water projects and will work with WGFD Biologists to repair water projects and identify locations and species that could benefit from new projects.

At WY Game & Fish, I've been working with Habitat Biologists on monitoring and improving aspen stands on South Pass and Green Mountain, which are important doe/fawn mule deer habitat. I am especially excited to assist with installing beaver dam analogs later this summer in a creek to improve riparian habitat and prepare it for potential future beaver reintroduction (beavers are my favorite animal partially because they create wetlands and are one of the most bizarre-looking critters!). I also rode into the Five Pockets area of the Washakie Wilderness to retrieve a wolverine trail camera and realized that this is one of the most beautiful places I've ever seen in Wyoming.

I am looking forward to learning more about the different projects WFW funds this summer and working with partners to identify where additional projects would benefit wildlife.

I am writing this newsletter article today from my "home office" in Wheatland, Wyoming, where temperatures outside are hitting 95 degrees, and temperatures inside my home are at 90. This kind of weather can make a fella pretty thirsty. Speaking of thirsty...we are approaching the time of year when many of our seasonal water sources are beginning to dry up. Wildlife will start to move towards more perennial water sources and to tanks, guzzlers, and other man-made storage facilities to meet their daily water intake requirements. We've had a pretty good spring across much of Wyoming, with some areas in northwestern Wyoming still with deep snows in higher elevations. Winter was tough, particularly in the western 1/3 of Wyoming, resulting in high mortality in mule deer and pronghorn in some areas. In Wyoming we take the good with the bad, and know that hard winters also lead to good runoff and that our reservoirs will be topped off, springs recharged, and forage on the plains "belly deep on a buffalo".

A big water development project on the horizon for the Foundation is the "Ferris Mountain Guzzlers". Four guzzlers will be installed in the uppermost elevations of the Ferris Mountains, located north of Rawlins. The guzzlers will service elk, mule deer, and an up and coming herd of bighorn sheep. Currently, water sources on the upper portions of the mountain are very limited, resulting in long travel distances to permanent water sources. These daily treks can result in increased predation levels on wild ungulates, particularly fawns, calves, and lambs. By installing water sources near preferred bighorn sheep lambing cover and escape terrain, we hope to increase survivability of bighorn ewes, lambs, and rams. The Ferris Mountains have received transplanted bighorn sheep from Devil's Canyon (located east of Lovell, WY) over the last two winters. They are doing well in their new homes, but can do even better with better water distribution and some planned prescribed fires.

On July 21 – 23, approximately 50 people representing Water For Wildlife Foundation, Bureau of Land Management, Wyoming Game and Fish Department, Bowhunters of Wyoming, and Wyoming Chapter of the Wild Sheep Foundation will gather and ascend the mountain to construct the guzzlers. Opportunities for "hands on" habitat projects that volunteers can participate in are sometimes few and far between, so this project is welcomed and we have a great turnout anticipated. Stay tuned for pictures, videos, and a full length story late in the Summer. Remote, motion detecting game cameras will be installed at the guzzler sites, and will provide good documentation of the wildlife species benefitting from our cooperative efforts. Projects like this one are a win: win for wildlife and the agencies and organizations involved. Thank you to Water For Wildlife for your financial contribution and donation of labor. Our two seasonal interns, Jacob and Joanna, have been hard at work planning this event during the month of June, and will be with us every step of the way until project completion.

I'll plan to see all of you at the upcoming September events, and look forward to discussing how we can best meet the needs of wildlife in Wyoming and throughout the West with you.

Over the past few months I have had a great experience getting to know the inter workings of the Water for Wildlife Foundation and the One Shot Past Shooters club. I am surprised by the multitude of activities and business that requires the almost daily attention of the board leadership and staff. Although I am paying attention, I am a very small part of the interworking of both organizations.

I was happy to participate in the spring meetings held during the Foo Foo Rah in Saratoga. The wonderful work of the Water for Wildlife Foundation has resulted in over \$72,000 in project support for the coming year. President Alan Pettersen, Executive Director Erica Flom, and Ryan Amundson of the Wyoming Game and Fish have done a tremendous job prioritizing and describing the projects, thus giving the board all the information necessary to approve the funding.

The other project underway is the planning for the remodel of the building to increase the display area for the museum, create adequate storage, and provide meeting space. The estimated cost of the remodel is \$225,000, so the Museum committee has been asked to prioritize and scale back the cost of the project. We intend to have a tour of the facility and more a details for the Past Shooters that visit Lander in September.

The remainder of the summer will be dedicated to organizing the hunt activities for the Past Shooters and the Water for Wildlife auction, working with the summer interns, and promoting the organizations. Don Kennedy has asked the staff to better organize the registration process to be used this fall. He is doing a fine job working for you to enhance your experience when you attend the One Shot.

Finally, I would like to thank our office manager Gina. She is doing a terrific job keeping the books up to date and maintaining a daily presence in the office. Gina and Erica have been working diligently to create a better experience for those that do business with the office. Also local past shooters Carl Asbell, Mickey Asbell, Jack Scarlett, Gary Nolde and others have been very helpful and supportive.

I look forward to meeting many of you this coming fall.

ONE SHOT ANTELOPE HUNT

This local organization is responsible for putting on the hunt. It is composed of people from the community of Lander, who spend years as setup crew, greeters, food purveyors and you name it. The club receives all challenge letters and requests, reviews and makes its decisions as to what teams are selected.

HISTORY

- Established in 1940 77 year-old non-sponsored event
- Many Celebrities Donald Trump Jr., Roy Rogers, Chuck Yeager, Charlie Daniels, Larry Hagman, Todd Helton, General Schwarzkopf, Joe Foss, Vice President Cheney, Wounded Warriors, Generals, Athletes, Astronauts, Musicians, Politicians
- 15 Consecutive Wyoming Governors since 1940
- Wyoming & Colorado are both hosts of the One Shot Antelope Hunt
- Sportsman from all over the world
- Legislation in 1979 allotted 80 licenses Those 80 licenses do not effect draw odds within the 5 allotted hunt areas. "The 80 licenses are above and beyond the established quota"
- Volunteers: Well over a hundred locals participate in the One Shot Antelope Hunt, from guides, greeters, ticket sales, registration, range crew, setup crew, Native American dancers
- Community: One Shot Hunt exposes Lander and the state of Wyoming to top CEO's and Fortune 500 businessmen, politicians, world leaders
- Sponsors of Hunter Safety Classes in Lander in coordination with the Wyoming Game & Fish
- Involved with economic and community development. The five day event attracts many individuals that benefit the local merchants of our county
 - Typically 8 teams of 3 New Shooters
- Eastern Shoshoni Tribal Tradition represented in the oldest invitational hunt in the country
- One Shot Hunt Club has 16 board members meeting once monthly throughout the year

ONE SHOT PAST SHOOTERS CLUB Established 1955

Once you compete in the hunt and return you are a Past Shooter. We have 100% new hunters joining the Past Shooters Club, entitling them to return to the hunt for life. The first year of return after the hunt, you will be assured an antelope permit, as the new members receive priority. The Past Shooters primary mission is to support the Hunt Club and Water for Wildlife Foundation.

- Membership 525 Members world wide
- License Draw Process All Past Shooters MUST apply for a Wyoming license through the Wyoming Game and Fish department, and be rejected, to enter into the remaining allotted license priority list.
- Returning New Past Shooters are prioritized a license, but are also required to apply through the Wyoming Game & Fish department and be rejected
- Any Past Shooter who successfully draws may defer their license to a sportsman or sportswoman that qualifies under the Game and Fish requirements to hold a license
- Past Shooters do not qualify unless providing proof of Wyoming Game and Fish rejection
- 95% of total licenses issued are to non-residents. All applicable license fees are paid directly to the Wyoming Game and Fish by the license holder. No profit is made by the Foundation or Clubs, face value of the license is paid directly to the Game & Fish.
- Many Past Shooters return annualy providing physical and monetary support.
- Past Shooters provide world wide contacts to help perpetuate the hunt.
- Community: \$90 thousand 1990 spent to renovate the Lander Community Center through the Water for Wildlife Foundation
- Donate Meat to Local Food Banks and Soldiers over seas
- 2016 Past Shooters donated \$103,000 to the Past Shooters Club



WATER FOR WILDLIFE FOUNDATION ESTABLISHED 1975

Water for Wildlife Foundation works to preserve and protect both habitat and wildlife in areas lacking the most vital resource of all - water.

Each Water development project is uniquely designed to take maximum advantage of location, conditions, and topography.

Through the careful placement, management, and upkeep of guzzlers, Water for Wildlife has helped improve habitats for the survival of hundreds of wildlife species.

- Total Committed to water projects: \$1.9 million \$1.6 million of which has been funded (an excess of \$102,000 in current obligations). Total Funding for Wyoming: <u>\$842,000</u>.
- Approved <u>\$72,000 in water projects in 2017</u> of which <u>\$48,500</u> allocated for Wyoming.
- Out of the 16 new water projects approved in 2017 10 are located throughout Wyoming
- 483 water projects have been built through the efforts of Water for Wildlife Foundation - (192 in Wyoming)
- Water for Wildlife Foundation currently has projects in 12 western states and South Africa
- Water for Wildlife benefits over 40 different species
- Partnering with over 50 different non-Government and Government Agencies
- Intern Program: Three years into the intern program. Water for Wildlife Foundation funds \$12,000 annually - paid directly to the WG&F
- Scholarship Program: Every year Water for Wildlife sponsors (4) \$1000 scholarships to Fremont County High School Graduates who apply and are currently enrolled to a college of their choice
- 2016 Past Shooters donated \$157,000 to Water for Wildlife
- Community: Water for Wildlife Foundation spent \$125,000 in 2012 toward the New Lander Community plus a \$20,000 Bronze Antelope for display
- Community: \$25,000 to the Middle Popo Agie Restoration project (river that goes through the city of Lander)
