#### A Crash Course in Chronic Wasting Disease



During my fall internship with Water for Wildlife and the Wyoming Game and Fish Department, I spent a lot of time sampling harvested deer and elk for chronic wasting disease. I want to take the time to share some facts about this disease, as it is important for

hunters to be aware of.

#### What is chronic wasting disease?


Chronic wasting disease (CWD) is a transmissible spongiform encephalopathy (TSE), a type of condition caused by misfolded proteins called prions. Prion proteins are generally concentrated in the central and peripheral nervous systems and cause progressive symptoms by refolding regular proteins into abnormal prion proteins. CWD affects members of the deer family Cervidae such as deer, elk, and moose. Other TSEs include mad cow disease in bovines, scrapie in sheep, and Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease in humans. CWD is spread between animals through direct or indirect contact with bodily fluids from infected individuals.

#### What does CWD look like?

CWD is a chronic and fatal disease. Over time, it damages the brain, resulting in weight loss as well as behavioral changes like lethargy and other symptoms like excessive salivation and drooping ears. However, CWD has a long incubation period of 18-24 months, during which infected animals don't show any visual symptoms of being sick.

#### Where does CWD occur?

CWD was first discovered in a captive mule deer herd in Colorado in 1967 and identified in wild mule deer and elk in Colorado and Wyoming in the 1980s. To date, it has been identified in 29 different states as well as in certain herds in Canada, Norway, Finland, Sweden, and South Korea. The prevalence of CWD tends to be highest in deer and in bucks.

#### Is it safe to eat an animal with CWD?

As of now, there are no known cases of a human becoming infected with CWD. However, the possibility of transmission occurring is still being investigated and it is recommended by the CDC not to eat meat from an animal known to have CWD.


#### What can we do about CWD?

There are no current treatments available for CWD. Proper disposal of carcasses may help reduce the spread between animals. It is recommended for hunters to wear rubber or latex gloves when handling harvested animals; avoid handling or eating the brain, spinal cord, eyes, spleen, and lymph nodes; bone out meat when butchering; and carefully clean and disinfect tools used for field dressing and meat processing.

Hunters can also get their harvested animals tested for CWD; in addition to confirming whether or not the animal is infected for the benefit of the hunter intending to eat the meat, this helps wildlife agencies monitor the disease. In Wyoming, you can get your animal sampled at a check station, your regional game and fish office, or you

## WILD GAME RECIPE

#### ~Pronghorn and Pineapple Kebabs~

These pronghorn and pineapple kabobs are lightly marinated and then threaded together creating a perfect pairing of tender meat and juicy sweet pineapple. In this recipe, I used a yellow bell pepper and onions as the side vegetables, but you can always substitute with other fresh veggies that are perfect for the grill.

#### Serves 4

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 11/2 pounds antelope, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 medium pineapple, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 2 yellow bell peppers, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 sweet yellow onion, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1/2 cup low sodium soy sauce
- 1/4 cup honey
- 3 tablespoon light rice wine vinegar
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- cooked quinoa or steamed rice
- salt and pepper

#### **DIRECTIONS**

In a small bowl, combine soy sauce, honey, rice wine vinegar and garlic.

Using 4 metal or soaked wooden skewers, alternately thread antelope and pineapple chunks (*note: you may have extra pineapple*). Set the antelope and pineapple skewers in a baking dish and pour marinade over the top. Cover and let marinate for 30 minutes. On separate skewers, thread bell pepper and onion. Season skewered bell pepper and onions with salt and pepper.

Grill all meat and vegetable skewers, covered, over medium-high heat for 5 minutes on each side or until the meat reaches your desired doneness. While the meat is grilling, baste with additional honey. Remove from heat when done and let the meat rest for 5 minutes.

Serve the pronghorn, pineapple and vegetables with cooked quinoa or steamed rice. ~Enjoy!
