# 2025 Fall Intern News



Water for Wildlife® welcomed **Blaine Kroger** as our Fall Intern this past September. Blaine was key to making our event such a success!

**A**fter working in Laramie for the Wyoming Game and Fish Department (WGFD) during the summer months, I started my internship in Lander with the Water For Wildlife Foundation in September. I was immediately thrown right in to preparing for the One Shot Antelope Hunt. There is a lot that happens behind the scenes for this event to be successful. Everything from creating PowerPoint presentations, printing labels for auction items, putting packets together for new and past shooters, editing websites, the list goes on and on. I had to quickly learn my way around a new computer and printer software, but with the help of Gina, YouTube, and Google, I was able to

make it through. During my time with the WGFD, I have conducted a variety of habitat surveys, everything from cheatgrass to willows, and sagebrush to aspen. I have also done antelope classification surveys, ripped out old fencing so it could be converted to wildlife friendly fence, helped run check stations, built Zeedyk structures to improve

watershed stability, plus many more activities. But by far the most enjoyable activity I have done was track collared moose using radio telemetry. Lots of information can be utilized by putting collars on animals, but the most obvious is being able to understand their movements and habitat use. However, in this case, I was trying to locate collared cow moose to look at their body

condition and overall health, as well as see if they had a calf. Equipment needed for this consists of a receiver, antennae, and a transmitter (collar). Each collar has a unique radio frequency. Simply hook up the antennae to the receiver, type in the frequency, and begin scanning. As you move the antennae around, the receiver will give off a series of beeps. Louder beeps means the antennae is pointing in the collars direction. This all sounds fairly simple, but there is indeed a skill factor involved. Being able to understand the volume of the beeps to know the direction and distance to the moose was more difficult than I had expected it to be. On my first few attempts, I had spooked the moose because I had misinterpreted



the distance and because I was fiddling with the receiver and not watching where I was going. I quickly realized I needed to treat this like I was hunting. I focused less on the



receiver and more on scanning my surroundings and watching where I stepped. Like any hunter, I would approach from downwind and stop every so often to scan with my binoculars and listen for movement. It is amazing how such a large animal can remain undetected, even when you know it is right in front of you. Using these techniques, I soon began getting eyes on some moose. Every free day I had I spent tracking moose in the mountains. It was such an awesome experience to spend the day alone in the mountains and get up close and personal with these

amazing creatures. Several of the collared cow moose I located were hanging out with some of the largest bull moose I had ever seen, it was exhilarating to see antlers of that size.

Overall, it was such an awesome experience to see the One Shot Hunt community come together and be surrounded by hundreds of hunters and

conservationists. Your generous donations contribute greatly to protecting and conserving Wyoming's wildlife and habitats for future generations to enjoy. I met so many wonderful people and it was truly an honor to play a small role in the 2025 One Shot Antelope Hunt.



# Making History

**B**eside every great woman... stands a man. Or in this case, beside three great women stood an extraordinary man. When my phone rang in April 2025 and a man named Admiral Dan Stone (ret.) invited me to join and captain his team, the Western Sportsmen, I intrinsically knew that here was a man who stands next to and empowers women. I was intrigued, and even though I didn't know what would be involved and what level of commitment would be required, I knew to my core that this was an opportunity of a lifetime, that this was an opportunity that one says yes to, and I did not hesitate. So began the journey of the next six-months, culminating in one of the highlights of my hunting, shooting, and wildlife conservation life...the legendary One Shot Antelope Hunt. When Dan explained his motivations for forming an all-female team, when he described his reasons for choosing the women he did, and his hope and desire that this historical, storied and excellent event might

produce its first winning all-female team, everything he shared struck a deep and resonant chord. I was fully in, and I was honored to represent Dan, compete on his behalf, and to Captain a team of such exceptional women.

Janet Holcomb blends grace, kindness and an artistic soul with a steely backbone honed during her eight-year tenure as the First Lady of Indiana, a survivor of a home burglary, and as a fierce mountain hunter, currently having completed the harvests of three of her Four North American Wild Sheep (FNAWS.) A skilled professional fundraiser, business leader, certified pistol instructor and steadfast supporter of wildlife and habitat conservation, she always embraces adventure, and challenges herself to try new things, even when it becomes uncomfortable. She is also a woman who says yes to opportunities, and she did not hesitate to join the Western Sportsmen team.

Amanda Kott is a member of the gregarious Kott family, dedicated supporters of all things One Shot and Water for Wildlife. Even though Amanda was just starting first year law in September 2025, she channeled her family's commitment to this event and also said yes to this opportunity that she had been waiting for all of her life – quite literally. Amanda was an infant in 2002 when her father, Reagan, was a competitor in One Shot. Amanda is vivacious, with boundless energy, a remarkably positive disposition and a willingness to step forward in un-

sual and challenging circumstances. She is notorious for even once having agreed to help a professor by agreeing to teach visiting dignitaries from Mongolia who spoke not a word of English to country line dance and unbelievably managed to do so through pantomime.

Professionally, I am the Founder and Chair of the Wild Sheep Foundation's Women Hunt program. It's a volunteer role, but it consumes my days and brings me incredible fulfillment and joy. Our program's whole purpose is to engage, educate, empower and inspire more women to enter the hunting and conservation space, a mission that is not without its challenges and opportunities. And there's nothing I love more than facing challenges head on, diving in with enthusiasm, focus and determination, peppered with a whole lot of fun. The One Shot Antelope Hunt is the perfect competitive hunting and shooting event to provide every participant and team the opportunity to excel, sweat a few bullets (no pun intended!), and have a great

time in support of a great cause, the Water for Wildlife Foundation.

Wearing the mantle of Captain was a responsibility I took seriously. I was determined to excel personally, but also to unite and motivate our team, and to do everything I could to fulfill Dan's vision and goals. With such strong teammates, all of us laser-focused on our objective to win, it made my role that much easier. I'm delighted to highlight a few achievements we each accomplished. During the range day competition, Janet was the only member of our team to hit the 500-yard Sheep Silhouette target off-hand...seems fitting for an accomplished sheep hunter! On that same day, Amanda wowed the crowd by winning not only the Pig Silhouette contest, but she also took second place to her brother Dalton in the Cowboy Action competition, missing first place by only a fraction of a second. As for myself, I was only one of 11 competitors and the only female to successfully hit the off-

hand antelope during Friday's sight-in and shooting competition.

Perhaps it was our performance during the two days of shooting competitions, perhaps it was the passion of the Brotherhood of Saint Hubertus, or perhaps it was a happy coincidence, but given that the three of us are all staunch wildlife conserva-

tionists, we were especially thrilled when our team sold during the team Calcutta for the record breaking amount of \$8,100, nearly double the former record. It was the cherry on top of a crazy day of shooting, and we were more than happy that we somehow inspired a fun and competitive bidding frenzy, all in the spirit of raising money for Water for Wildlife.

The building pressure on Friday was not lost of any of us, yet we had a great time throughout the day, from the BBQ and license issuance to the incredible Sinks Canyon and nail-biting sight-in and shooting competition, to the Legend of the Hunt and Blood Brothers / Sisters Ceremony. What a memorable time, around the blazing bond fire, in the company of magnificent Shoshone Tribal leaders and members, all of the competitors and Past Shooters, their families, members of the community and volunteers!

The dawn of the hunt day was just what you would expect. 24 energized and determined hunters and guides, nerves jumping and smiles wide! The three of us had decided to take some sage advice we received Friday night and hunt our own hunt. We turned our phones into airplane mode and set our laser sights on our individual goal of harvesting an antelope in one shot, as quickly as we could. As the day moved on and Janet and I found ourselves back at the Center, successful in our goal, we saw on the board that all members of all the teams had reported in, except for ours. Amanda was still in the field, and our team was tied with two other teams, J-Parade and Monterey Mountain Men, with two One Shots each. That meant that if Amanda was successful, we would automatically win. To say this was a nail biter was an understatement! When the call came in that Amanda had taken her antelope with One

Shot in the final hour of the hunt, we were overjoyed! Mission accomplished, for us and for Dan. We were also struck by the significance of being the first all-female team to win this competition. We were humbled, and we also felt proud of our accomplishment and for setting this new marker.

I could continue to write for pages and pages about my experiences during the One Shot Antelope Hunt, but I'll close with a tiny piece of bragging rights. A gentleman at the Lander Bar that Saturday night told our team, "Even if another all-women team wins this competition in the future, they can never beat you. You'll always be the first women to have won." And so, we did make history on September 20, 2025, when Dan Stone's Western Sportsmen Team became the first all-female team to win the One Shot Antelope Hunt. What an honor it is for the three of us to have achieved this accomplishment. We are blessed, and we can't wait to come back in 2026!

Notes of thanks: I would like to thank my friend, Past Shooter John Lake, who recommended me to Dan as a competitor on his team. I can't thank you enough, John, for this life-changing experience! To my hunt guide, the (mighty) Dave Meeker, thank you so very much for your excellent guiding skills, your calm demeanor, and your fabulous sense of humor...and for guiding me to an antelope that I was able to harvest in one shot! Thank you, Reid Odde, you were an absolute delight as our Team Greeter, so professional, so on-point, and so easy to work with. To all of the extraordinary volunteers who worked so hard to deliver a first-class event, thank you; your efforts were noticed and appreciated. 

# WFW Site visit 2025

## Tensleep Canyon preserve



As I began my new job as Executive Director at the Water for Wildlife Foundation, I realized that I had only visited one of our projects, #429, when it was dedicated in 2017. Since much of my time is spent in the office, I made it my goal to visit at least one project, if not more every year. In 2024 summer intern, Skyler LaRosa and I visited two projects near Lander in the Gas Hills. These projects were fairly new but in need of repair! Since then I have followed up with the agencies we granted funds to and at some point, I hope to revisit these and see if any progress has been made.

This past September when I was invited by our project partner, The Nature Conservancy, to visit the Tensleep Preserve, I jumped at the chance. They are in Phase II of the Canyon Creek Restoration project located in the Tensleep Preserve. Our host was Trey Davis, Eastern Wyoming Stewardship Director, and he gave my husband Ken and I, the insider's tour. We met Trey at the site manager's lodging and he took us to see the education center that hosts groups ranging from university researchers to elementary school groups. Our next stop was to view Canyon Creek from above (Photo: Right)



Finally was hiking a few miles into the heart of the Tensleep Preserve, a 12-mile stretch of Canyon Creek. This creek slices deeply through the south-western flanks of the Bighorn Mountains and hosts ancient pictographs and Native American gathering sites. Water for Wildlife funding has helped to restore Canyon Creek by eliminating the noxious weeds that crept in when the creek was used for irrigation. Current downstream landowners are working with the Nature Conservancy to tackle this problem as well. Once the invasive weeds are under control, the willows and native flora can help restore the Canyon Creek riparian area. (Photo top left) The canyon is indeed a special place!

We enjoyed hiking in such a quiet and cool environment as the walls insulate both sound and temperature. The solitude was amazing and enhanced the enjoyment of viewing the ancient petroglyphs. We saw signs of ungulates that use the area as well amphibians and fish and I am amazed how nature can repair itself with a little help from us!

Trey gave us a deeper understanding of the project and I am thankful to him for taking the time to show us the project. I can only learn so much from reading the applications or completion reports. (Photo Right: view looking away from petroglyph site)
